Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth & Sustainable Development (RFPD), Inc. Annual Narrative Report—July 2009 to June 2010

I. Executive Summary:

RFPD has had a successful year. It has gained much attention from Rotarians, NGOs, Government leaders and Religious leaders. In this report you will find information on our population-focused projects, continuous membership maintenance and some growth, along with advocacy efforts that reach across the globe. RFPD has created new partnerships, increased outside funding for its large-scale projects and continues to and develop the vision of the future of RFPD.

We continue our effort to educate Rotarians, Rotary Leadership and others on Population Concerns. We have increased our activities to cultivate Rotaract (Rotarian Youth) and Inner Wheel (Spouses of Rotarians). We support our Country Chairs (CC's), Zone Coordinators (ZC's) and Assistant Zone Coordinators (AZC's).

RFPD's key strategies are to:

- Initiate, support and co-fund Matching Grant projects with support from The Rotary Foundation. Projects initiated and supported by RFPD include maternal and child health, reproductive health education, family planning, literacy, micro-credit and vocational skills;
- Organize large projects co-funded with other funding sources;
- Advocate on population issues, including alleviating poverty, educating women, informing on and organizing child spacing services, reducing child and maternal mortality;
- Promote balance between population and resources.

II. Highlights:

• RFPD had excellent exposure and acceptance at the Rotary International (RI) Convention in Montreal, Quebec, Canada, June 2010. Activities included:

Breakout Sessions

RFPD conducted its 8th and 9th RI breakout session triggering lively discussions. Both sessions were full to capacity with 350 and 150 attendants. The first session "Successful Funding of World Community Service Projects with Funding from Other Sources" concentrated on getting funding from other sources, showed examples of successfully co-funded Rotary projects initiated by RFPD and how to find funding opportunities and obtain funds. RFPD's partner, Population Media Center's President Bill Ryerson, shared his expertise in getting funds. There is a range of funding opportunities available (e.g. from the European Union), which are not used efficiently. The second breakout session "How to Make a World Community Service Project Sustainable" dealt with the necessity to make Rotary projects sustainable and showed how to achieve sustainability based on population projects. Choosing an 'Area of Focus' of the Future Vision Plan, finding innovative solutions for existing problems and incorporating local communities and governments throughout project implementation are most important cornerstones for making projects sustainable. Many attendants demanded a stronger focus on sustainability in Rotary projects. It was emphasized, that projects tackling family planning pave the way to sustainability.

Annual General Meeting

Over sixty people attended the Annual General Meeting, which was held to inform members, potential members and supporters of RFPD. Ed Barry, Consultant for The Population Institute delivered a thoughtful and motivating speech on "The Sustainability Planner." Buck Lindsay presented Mr. Barry with a Paul Harris Fellow. Ed was surprised and excited by this award and accepted with great appreciation. RFPD Board Members presented various topics that related to RFPD and RI.

PDG Lindsay presented the minutes from the 2009 Annual General Meeting, which are available upon request, along with a report on the most recent Council on Legislation decision concerning the Population Standing Committee Proposal.

RFPD's Chairman, Harald Marschner, presented his report for 2009-2010, which included many accomplishments for RFPD. He also commented on the upcoming year for RFPD, which includes increasing membership, projects and advocacy for Population Concerns. He extended his thanks to our members, RFPD Country Chairs, Zone Coordinators and Area Coordinators for their work and dedication to RFPD.

Incoming RI Director, Sam Owori attended RFPD's Annual General meeting and gave a 10 minute presentation on Maternal & Child Health. Director Sam gave a compelling speech that included his support for RFPD. He stated that Maternal & Child Health is very important. He is fearful for the future and for mother's health. He indicated that if we do not take responsibility now, future generations will suffer. He stands behind RFPD and thanked the board for their work.

RFPD's Nafis Sadik Award for Courage was given to Jeffrey Sachs, Director of The Earth Institute, Columbia University. Although Prof. Sachs could not attend, he graciously accepted the award and indicated that he has the utmost respect for Rotary and its Action Group RFPD. He supports RFPD's mission fully.

Rekha Shetty led an open forum which generated many ideas and support for RFPD. Several Country Chairs commented on their work and challenges within their country. PDG Shetty also discussed her work and the accomplishments of the Saheli Centers in India.

Robert Zinser reported in the RI Ad Hoc Committee on the Rotarian Action Group (RAG) meeting that was held in San Diego in January of 2010. Suggestions were given by the RAG representatives. The RI Board will vote on many topics concerning RAGs at the board meeting in November. PDG Zinser also discussed The Rotary Foundation's Future Vision Plan and how RFPD is working to connect pilot districts.

Cocktail Reception

RFPD held a cocktail reception for over 40 people. This was a two-hour event that followed our successful breakout session on Monday, June 21st. The event allowed for continued discussions on the breakout session, strategies for sustainability and further advocating for population issues. Rotaractors joined the reception.

House of Friendship Exhibit Booth

RFPD hosted an exhibit booth in the House of Friendship along side the project booth "Maternal & Child Health." This is one of RFPD's largest projects, running 15 years with over \$5 million in total project funding. Members and potential members, RFPD leaders and new Rotarians had the opportunity to network and discuss important topics as they pertained to Population, Maternal and Child Health and Sustainability.

III. Annual Results and Impact by Region:

1) North America and Eastern Russia

<u>Membership:</u> Total members 1,486 (418 lifetime, 1,068 annual). Fragile Earth is distributed to all members and Zone Coordinators. They in turn distribute to their clubs and those that they present to. All club members are encouraged to join RFPD.

<u>Speaking Engagements:</u> total of 61 RFPD presentations given by Area Coordinator, Zone Coordinators, General Secretary and Executive Director (New York, Florida, California, Georgia, Lebanon and various places in Latin America).

Other initiatives by Area Coordinator, Bill Cadwallader:

- Accompanied D7170 Rotarians to Bogota, Columbia to see where they had placed the 130 computers that our club had sent them. He visited 8 schools in the mountains of Columbia plus established a relationship with a single mothers program and trade school system within the city of Bogota.
- Traveled to Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic with Dr. Jim Fogel to organize a district program for testing high school students for HIV. Addressed the Rotary Club of Santo Domingo. Met the leaders of the OraSure Technologies and their team in Santo Domingo.
- Organized a project booth at the RI Convention in Montreal for the program in Barquisimeto, Venezuela. Introduced our idea to the Chairman of the Rotary Foundation Trustees. Met with the leaders of OraSure Technologies, who fabricate the OraQuick HIV 1 & 2 tests that we advocate for our program. OraSure offered us \$5,000 OraQuick HIV 1 & 2 tests for use on the Dominican Republic and Haiti (worth \$6,000). We were told that if we were successful in the use of these tests we could have access to 30,000 more tests. If the use of these went well Rotarians could have access to 1.2 million tests (total value \$6 million).
- Met with the leaders of the Washington DC's school Departments of Education and Health to learn about their programs to reduce venereal disease, HIV and adolescent pregnancies. Our materials are in Spanish and English.

2) Europe

<u>Membership:</u> This has continuously increased in Europe. Specific to Germany are those increases in Rotarians, Rotaractors and InnerWheelers. In Austria, 10 new lifetime members were solicited by Chairman, Harald Marschner. Lifetime Membership for Europe – 1,746 (thereof Germany – 1,703).

Speaking Engagements/Advocacy:

- Two public "Mother Nights" were held in Germany.
- Presentations were given to the German Minister for Economic Cooperation and Development.
- Three presentations in round table for health issues were held. Topics were for health issues of the German Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development.
- RFPD Germany organized the 5th RFPD Academy for Rotarians, Rotaractors, InnerWheelers and Non-Rotarian guests.
- Country Chairs and many others in Europe presented Population Issues in Clubs and Districts.

RFPD Exhibit Booths: exhibits held at several Rotary events, mainly District Assemblies.

Other initiatives:

- Preparation of scaling up of our model project "Reduction of Maternal Mortality." This project amount of Euro 1.6 million is co-funded by the German Government is meanwhile being approved and will start November 1, 2010. See www.maternal-health.eu which is continously updated.

3) North Africa/Egypt

Membership: Increase of 5 lifetime members.

Speaking Engagements/Advocacy: On-going speeches were given on RFPD by the Area Coordinator and Country Chairs.

Other initiatives: RFPD Egypt started a very close cooperation with the Egyptian Government, the Ministry of Family Planning and Population, and there are new projects in this regard in villages in Upper Egypt. Past Rotary Club President (Mrs.) Amal Namek was accepted as a new Board member of RFPD Egypt. Mrs. Namek established the new RC Cairo - Maadi ElSarayat and H.E.Moushira Khattab, Minister of Family Planning and Population is one of its members. Chairman Harald Marschner, Area Coordinator Salem Mashhour and Country Chair Ahmes Gabrial were hosted by Moushira Khattab and had frank discussions on population topics. Khattab is very interested in the ongoing Rotarian population projects.

4) Africa - Sub Sahara

<u>Membership Advocacy among Rotarians:</u> The two Country Chairs in Nigeria are working hard to ensure that all Rotarians in Nigeria (about 5,000) all become members of RFPD. At the moment the

membership of RFPD in Nigeria is close to 2,000, mainly from two Districts 9110 and 9125. A major factor that helps to recruit more members for RFPD is the presence of humanitarian projects. A new initiative to promote more membership, using the close association of Nigerian Rotarians with German/Austrian Rotarians is being put in place through a process called "Club Twinning". By this process, the first requirement is to solidify membership by Nigerian Clubs with German and Austrian Clubs, then each club must come up with a project to address UN Millennium Goal No 5., and RI Area of Focus No. 4 which is Improvement in Maternal and Child Health aimed at achieving REDUCTION IN MATERNAL AND CHILD MORTALITIES in our respective communities for RI Matching Grant. This process will be extended to the rest of Africa later.

Maintaining Old Projects and Establishing New Ones: Over 10 matching grants projects initiated by RFPD are in various stages of implementation in Nigeria (See project list). The 3H project in district 9120 Nigeria on Child Spacing, Family Health and Aids Education, and the large-scale project on Improvement of Maternal Health "Prevention, Treatment and Rehabilitation of Obstetric Fistulae started in 2005 have been completed successfully. With the help of our German friends 4 new projects are being initiated on:

- (a) Extensive Public Awareness Campaign on Improving Maternal and child Health through Community Dialogue Sessions.
- (b) Continuation of the project on Improvement of Maternal and Child Health especially Improving Quality Assurance
- (c) Scaling up of the Maternal Health project in Abuja to include Quality Assurance
- (d) Improving Maternal and Child nutrition through provision of Vitamin Supplements The total expected cost of all these projects is close to 2M Euros.

A new project initiative between the pilot Districts 1860 (Germany) and District 9110 (Nigeria) has reached advance stage of TRF approval. The project MATERNAL AND INFANT MORTALITY PLUS CHILD SPACING REDUCTION IN SOUTHWESTERN

NIGERIA aims to focus on the reduction of maternal and infant mortalities through improving reproductive health among women of child bearing age in three villages located in Lagos, Ogun and Oyo states in Southern Nigeria. The identified communities in Oyo and Ogun States are essentially rural, while the third community in Lagos State is urban; these combinations will facilitate comparative evaluation of reproductive health interventions between rural and urban communities in the three States. In the rest of Africa, numerous successful projects are being executed by RFPD in the Congo, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Kenya, Uganda, and Gabon. Some of these project reports are sent directly to RFPD HQ. In Tanzania, the CC has established 23 Rotary Clubs within the year and has ensured that they embark on RFPD supported projects. A new project on CLEFT PALATE CORRECTIVE SUGERIES is being planned for Cameroon.

<u>Collaboration and Networking with Stakeholders:</u> In Nigeria a close collaboration with stakeholders is being maintained. There has been a lot of cooperation, and responsibility sharing among the Stakeholders in the Maternal and Child Health projects. Collaboration with **UNFPA** and **Engender Health** are the most productive. This is a unique cooperation effort as a result of intensive networking of project implementers.

<u>Funds from other sources:</u> The projects in Nigeria continue to attract support funds from other sources such as German Rotarians, German Government and European Union largely as a result of

the excellent work of PDG Robert Zinser, the Area Coordinator for European. Also support has come from Austrian Rotarians and the Austrian Government through the participation of PDG Marschner

RFPD Advocacy and Club and District Meetings and Visits: The Area Coordinator for Sub Saharan Africa used all available speaking engagements in and out of Rotary to propagate the vision, and purpose of RFPD. Apart from several club visits in Nigeria, The Area coordinator was a major speaker at the District Assembly and PETS of D9125. He is schedule to speak at the RI Institute in Kampala Uganda, and to address all the Past Governors in Nigeria also in September at the International Polio Summit in September 2010. RFPD leadership regularly participated in State and Federal Government Meetings on Maternal and Child health, some of them involving local and International NGOs, with discussions centering on the need for better improved reproductive health care for all women of child bearing age in Nigeria. It is gratifying to note that some of these meetings have contributed to a policy change by the Federal and some state governments in Nigeria, offering free medical care (Pre and Post natal) to all pregnant women in the country. Although the policy has already been pronounced, its implementation is yet haphazard.

4) India and Pakistan

<u>Membership:</u> A major campaign for membership in RFPD India has been undertaken. 1,000 pieces of membership information were distributed. 43 lifetime members were gained. 100 members was the original goal. Additional Rotarians joined in this effort.

Speaking Engagements: Speeches were given on behalf of RFPD throughout the year by the Area Coordinator and District Exhibit booths were done within all Zone areas (7).

<u>Other initiatives:</u> Saheli Centers continue to be successful and grow. The incoming RI President, Kalyan Banerjee, explained he wants to establish 400 Saheli Centers in Nepal, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and India.

5) Latin America

Membership: Efforts to increase membership included distributing membership forms at each RFPD presentation, encouraging attendants to join, and inviting Rotarians from the booth exhibits at the district conferences, zone and all other events. Lifetime Members in Latin America re 26 and Annual are 139, overall total is 165.

Advocacy: RFPD exhibit booths were held at the Rotarian Institutes of Tampico, Mexico (1), Gramado, Brazil (1) and Pilar, Argentina (2). Eleven events were held that included RFPD activities, planning meetings and awareness campaigns in Argentina, Brazil and Mexico.

 Organizational Changes: Bill Cadwallder resigned his position as Area Coordinator for North America & Eastern Russia. Frank Wargo was appointed to this position. Charlie Rogers (long-time Zone Coordinator) was appointed as Assistant Area Coordinator. Jennifer Hendrickson resigned her position as Executive Director after a term of six years. A part-time professional, Lynn Boren, has been hired to take over the responsibilities. The title has been changed to Administrative Director.

X. Principal Challenges:

- Gaining members the economy has had an impact on increasing membership and donations.
- Gaining other funders for general operating funds. 23 foundations were approached in 2008-2009 and 7 have been approached so far in 2010.
